## **EWR Consultation closes 9<sup>th</sup> June 2026 – Have your say**

The current EWR consultation closes on Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup> June 2026, so please make sure you submit your views before the deadline. This is expected to be the final route-wide consultation before the Development Consent Order is submitted in 2027.

This consultation includes some changes to the proposals, including changes to the proposed construction zones and also includes information on which roads EWR would use for construction traffic. It is important to submit your views on these aspects, as they are likely to have a large impact on how we travel between the villages in the ward during construction, which is likely to take many years. For example, 3 out of 4 of the roads in/out of Haslingfield are proposed to be primary construction traffic routes.

## **SCDC Zero Carbon Communities Grants scheme now open**

The latest round of the Zero Carbon Communities Grant scheme is now open for applications. This is a great opportunity to bring forward projects that benefit both the environment and our communities.

Grants of between £2,000 and £19,500 are available, with a total pot of £152,000. The funding will be used to support projects that reduce carbon emissions, boost nature recovery, or foster greater community engagement on climate change and nature. It is available to voluntary and community sector groups, charities, and parish councils.

This year's scheme has been updated to reflect feedback from communities and the Council's [Climate and Nature Strategy](#). Eligibility has been widened to include projects on school sites and applications from parent and teacher associations, where there is a clear benefit to the wider community. Sports and recreational groups, such as bowls clubs, are also eligible if their projects support community wellbeing, mental health or stronger local connections.

Examples of eligible projects include:

- Improving community buildings (e.g. insulation, heat pumps, solar panels, LED lighting)
- Supporting low-carbon travel (e.g. electric vehicles, cycling infrastructure)
- Community-led initiatives to reduce waste, support nature, or encourage sustainable lifestyles

## **136 new council homes delivered in the last financial year**

South Cambridgeshire District Council increased its supply of council homes by 136 between April 2025 and March 2026. This is the largest annual increase ever achieved, surpassing the previous year's record of 91 homes. This is beyond what is achieved in many other areas but is vital due to high house prices and rents..

The new Council homes were delivered across Cottenham, Cambourne, Over, Barrington, Northstowe and Fulbourn and included 106 Affordable Rent homes and 30 Shared Ownership homes. This brings the Council's overall housing stock numbers to 5,875 at the end of March 2026.

## **Reforms to Judicial Review for Infrastructure**

On the 20th May, HM Treasury has published [a paper setting out proposals on further reforms to judicial review of major infrastructure](#). The government now intends to go further in ensuring that legal challenge is focused, proportionate and does not create unnecessary delay to the delivery of nationally important infrastructure. This paper sets out two proposed reforms to the current process for consenting major infrastructure – subject to detailed design and the passage of underpinning legislation – which would allow for proportionate protection from judicial review: a parliamentary authorisation mechanism; and a challenge window mechanism.

## **Development Corporation**
